PfA BANGALORE AT GLANCE

People for Animals-Bangalore (PfA), is a non-profit conservation organization working towards the rescue and rehabilitation of urban wildlife. PfA was formed in 1996, by Founder Trustees Alpana Bhartia, Namrata Dugar, Gauri Maini Hira, and Arushi Poddar.

PfA works on promoting harmony between humankind and our natural environment. We recognize that like us, humans, animals too can experience pain and emotions, and as a result, deserve certain basic rights protecting them from adversities caused by humans.

We aim to:

Provide timely, specialized veterinary care to injured urban wild animals, rehabilitate them, and then release them into their natural or adopted habitats. We work towards creating awareness amongst citizens of all ages and backgrounds about urban wildlife and aim to instill an understanding of the need for cohabitation between humans and our natural world. We are actively engaged in community outreach and education about our local environment, and how we can enrich and protect it. Our objective includes developing a practice that employs better wildlife care techniques by engaging specialists and veterinarians from across the world.

The Dire Need for Urban Wildlife Hospitals

According to a 2011 census, Bangalore had seen a human population growth of 53%, as compared to 2001. This has grown even further in the last 7 years. Every year, the population grows by 0.496 million. This population explosion has increased the unplanned urbanization, which has adversely affected the city's lakes, parks, and partial forests. This has caused significant ecological imbalance and led to an increase in displaced, injured and orphaned animals. While the Wildlife Acts are designed to protect the nation's wildlife, they cannot protect the wildlife that lives in the cities. This then leaves the citizens of Bangalore city to responsibly and actively engage in helping and saving the wild animals that live around us. This defines the role of PfA Wildlife Hospital.

PfA's principal concerns are crisis management and the provision of quick, efficient aid to those animals that require it the most.

Educational Institutions that visited PFA





PfA believes that awareness about animal welfare is most effective when disseminated among the youth. At PfA, we conduct practical sessions for students about wildlife and the necessity to co-exist with nature.

Students and staff from various institutions across Bangalore visit our shelter to familiarise themselves with our work. A brief introduction about PfA and its goals is given at the 'Knowledge Centre' following which they are divided into groups and escorted around the shelter under the careful guidance of our staff.

The interactive tour around the 6-acre campus usually lasts about 1-2 hours, and the groups learn about the in-care animals, the threats faced by wild animals in the city, and about the species of wildlife that live around us. The session is then followed by an activity and a 'Reflection Session' where the group discusses what they have learned during their visit.

The learning experience ends with the students taking a pledge to protect and preserve wildlife and to stand up against any atrocities committed against wildlife.

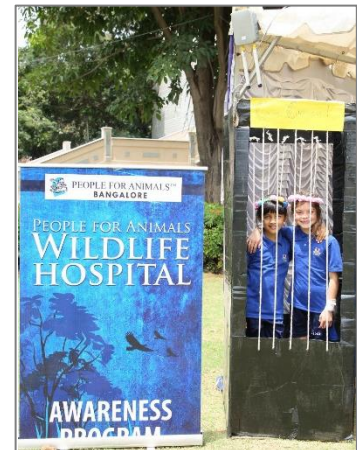

Awareness Events



An important part of Pfa is our commitment to spreading awareness through outreach programs, workshops, and training programs. This includes different types of activities and programs held in our shelter as well as in different parts of the city, at times extending across India.

Some of the aspects we focus on include how to celebrate festivals in eco-friendly ways such as using clay idols instead of colored idols, the dangers of Manja thread to birds, and biodegradable alternatives to artificial colored powders used during festivities. We also strive to sensitize the public to the importance of urban wildlife. How to react one comes across an injured or orphaned wild animal, snakebite protocol, basic identification of urban wildlife, habitat conservation, etc. are some of the topics we educate during our awareness sessions.

While PfA works extensively towards the rescue, treatment, and release of Bangalore's Urban Wildlife, it gives equal importance to the rights of domestic animals, animals that are victims of the pet trade, and problems being posed to our natural environment.

Workshops & Training Programs

Workshops are held regularly for the veterinary community by the PfA veterinarian team on different aspects of veterinary care. With the experience gained over the years, several novel practices have been developed on treatments and rehabilitation - for specific species. These workshops give an opportunity to work with specialists across the region and in other parts of the world, to exchange and share information with them.

Various workshops are routinely held for the general public as well to spread awareness about wildlife conservation and protection.



An international workshop on Snakes - 'Serpentia' was held on 20th and 21st July, at the premises of PfA wildlife hospital & rescue center in Kengeri, Bangalore. The 2-day workshop was attended by veterinarians from various parts of the country, including the Venom Research Center in Chittagong Medical College, Bangladesh. The workshop was inaugurated by Dr. Narayan Bhatt, Dean of Bangalore Veterinary College, along with Dr. Murlidhara, Director of wildlife science, Bangalore.

While we conduct veterinary workshops routinely, we decided to start conducting Sunday Workshops for the public to take part in. These workshops are handled by experts from the respective fields and cover vast topics, from species identification and behavioural patterns to wildlife conservation and photography.



The first one in the series was held on the 3rd of November 2019. The workshop was on the topic 'Identification and Behaviour of Snakes'. The following awareness workshop held on the 11th of November titled 'Fauna around Us' had participants who were elucidated on the wildlife living around us in an urban environment.

The third workshop held on the 24th of November was on 'Ethical Wildlife Photography'. It was facilitated by Pavan Yaragudi, a wildlife photographer and mentor based in Bangalore, and Gururaj Moorching, a businessman turned birder, who has a record for photo-documenting 951 species of birds in just one year (2018) out of the total 1,317 species in India.



Two Sunday Workshops were held in the month of December. The first one was based on the topic of 'Snakebite Management and Myths' and was conducted by PfA's Senior Veterinarian, Dr Karthik M. The second workshop was based on the Citizen Science Program. Our volunteer coordinators conducted this workshop that dealt with observation-based inquiry and public participation in Scientific Research.

PfA in the News

Due to the numerous wild animals PfA has rescued and treated over the last year, including rarely seen animals, severely wounded cases, and difficult confiscations, we have been mentioned by various newspapers such as The Hindu, The New Indian Express, The Mint, Deccan Herald, Prajavani, Bangalore Mirror, The Times of India, The Economic Times, etc.

Apart from that, our awareness programs and work have been published in news articles throughout the year. This helped us in yielding a bigger audience to spread awareness about the environment and wildlife. As a result, we have had more visitors, an increase in rescue calls, more involvement in our work, and has inspired people to contribute generously to us.

Withdraw monkey capture & relocation order: Maneka

Bengaluru: Stating that evolved protocols should be in place to deal with the monkey menace, former Union minister and animal rights activist Maneka Gandhi requested principal chief conservator of forest (wildlife) Sarajay Mohan to withdraw the state's order permitting capture and relocation of monkeys in Bengaluru.
At the talk titled 'Living With The Wild' organised by People For Animals (PFA) here on Saturday, Maneka Gandhi pointed out that relocation is not a real solution as monkeys often tend to come back.
She showed a letter sent to the help of forest staff. She said, "Kindly withdraw the order. Curses of rupees have been spent by the state in monkey relocation and they keep coming back. Himachal Pradesh has spent crores on monkey sterilisation yet studies show that monkeys become more aggressive later."
"Monkeys go where there is food and we need evolved protocols on dealing with monkeys. We have to firstly stop feeding them," she added.
"Since inception, PFA Bengaluru has rescued over 25,000 urban wild animals of over 200 species," said Alpina Pharia, founder trustee, PFA, Bengaluru.



Maneka Gandhi said relocation is not a real solution as monkeys often tend to come back by PCCF to chief conservator of forest of Karnataka, last year giving permission to authorities to capture monkeys and relocate them with the help of forest staff.

An adult parakeet was kept as a pet and due to boredom and confinement, it started picking on its own feathers, thus making it bald at the front. The pet owner thought some of its feathers were falling on their own and ignored it, but after a while, he started noticing that the bird is continuously picking on its feathers and was in a terrible state in some time. He took the parakeet to People for Animal (PFA) Wildlife Hospital and Rescue Centre for treatment, where he was told that it is illegal to keep it.
Dr Karthik, senior veterinarian, PFA, said due to pulling its own feather, the parakeet's back was wounded, for which a general treatment was given for recovery. "This is the Alexandrine Parakeet. Even when the parrot was brought here, it did not stop picking on its own feathers. So we had to put a collar around to stop it. Due to confinement, the bird was unable to fly freely and got bored. If either spent time preening itself or eating, but for how long can it keep up with it? So it started picking on its feathers. Sometimes, the feathers grow back but at times, they may not," said Dr Karthik. Jayashankar Kallan, co-founder and executive trustee, PFA, Bengaluru.

arian from People For (PFA) Wildlife Hospital and Rescue Centre, spotted the owl had red wing. He took the owl to the hospital, but it died. An inmorten revealed that it fered an internal head. The bird was either at or it fell from a height running away when he scared it. We do not know the exact reason but this is one of the reasons, as try to chase them away leads to their displacement.
Dr Roopa Satish, wildlife veterinarian, Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation Centre (WIRC), said, "Villagers clip parakeets' feathers and keep it with them. Their feathers are used for various purposes. This is the season for barn owls, the hospital has seen a spike in the number of Barn owl rescues as compared to the rest of the year. "Barn owls hatch during this period. The chicks learn to fly when they are in the fledging stage and they are very susceptible to displacement. Interaction with cats or humans could lead to such incidents. It forces a state of shock and pro care is essential then," Dr Karthik added.
So far, the PFA has rescued 10 barn owl and fledglings in the year, which is quite a number in a short time. Doctors give two reasons for increase of such cases: being the loss of habitat and other being the incidents in the city. The male in the urban area is a loss of their habitat. Their favourite food is rodents.
